[5:40] Scheduled Guest Speakers

- Mr. Charles White, PI/Director of Academic Enrichment Upward Bound Program
 - o Upward Bound is a grant program sponsored by US Department of Education
 - We are here to ask for assistance. Every year we have a 6-week program for high school students to be hosted on campus and taking classes run by instructors.
 - o We need instructors for Chemistry, Research Guidance, Psychology, ACT Preparation
 - o If you would like to work for us this summer, please contact us. Even if your specialization is not for the categories listed above, still reach out and talk to us for instructing opportunities
 - Q from Senator #16: Is Chemistry and Research two separate things or the same class?
 A: Those are two separate classes. One is Chemistry, the other is guiding Research projects the students are doing on their own in the library not necessarily in Chemistry.
 - O **Q from Senator #99:** How many hours is it and is there a syllabus or other materials for these classes?
 - **A:** You get paid for 6-12 hours a week starting \$17 and up to \$25 per hour; and depending on the course depends on the materials already available.

President's Report: George T. Fields, GSS President

• Resolutions:

- O Tonight, we will be considering a resolution sponsored by Stacie Beach, Senator 16 from History.
 - This resolution represents a few things: an opportunity for us to come together to make our voices heard collectively as one.
 - It also represents our willingness as graduate students and stakeholders of the university, to recognize where we as a university can do better and to seek positive change to move on from the "way we've always done things."
 - It furthers our call for a place at the table through shared governance, to be included, and to provide input so we can hopefully avoid problematic situations to our best ability in the future.
 - As this university grows, it is imperative that the university keeps its people in the forefront of the minds of those affecting change. If we put blinders on and focus on the future, we ignore those directly beside us.
 - As we take this resolution into consideration this evening, let's all reflect on our positions in this university and take stock of where we are in progressing our voices.

• Stipends:

- O Based on information I received today, the stipend resolution to be introduced on May 9 is inevitable. I am personally grateful for the hard work and collaboration that interim senior Vice Chancellor Bolton and Dean Thompson have put into gathering up-to-date data on graduate stipends in academic units across campus.
 - The resolution will be focused on the increased cost-of-living since the minimums were increased in August 2021, as well as the cost-of-attendance cited by the university.
 - Our goal will be to suggest, based on relevant data, increases in stipend minimums for graduate students on assistantships.
 - Because May 9 is our chance to pass this, and because it affects many of the Senators in this room, I am going to call for those interested in working on this resolution to raise their hands now so we can be direct in our efforts to pass this important piece of legislation.

• Chancellor's Attendance at the Final Session on May 9

- o As many of you know, the Chancellor will be attending the final GSS Session on May 9.
- o I encourage Senators to take additional steps to ensure they can attend so we maximize our chance to be heard.

- o We are providing a night of fun for our Senators at Main Event in West Knoxville.

 - o Majority of present senators 'voted' for May 10th.

GSS Program Coordinator, Nick Jakel will review the results of the GSS annual election.

- 191 total votes were cast by graduate students in 3 calendar days
- Katherine Trubee received 94.88% of votes and has been named GSS President Elect for 2023-2024
- Hannah Thompson received 96.59% of votes and has been named GSS Vice President Elect for 2023-2024
- For context, in last year's election there were 252 total votes in 8 calendar days
- Comment from Katherine Trubee: We are looking for senators interested in serving on the executive Committee next year, so please let us know if you are interested.

[6:07] Discussion: Cost of Living Study from the Bredesen Center

GSS Senator Kyle Llopart will review a study on cost of living conducted within the Bredesen Center.

- Here to share the results of the survey on Cost of Living in Science and Engineering.
- Even if not your department, I hope you find this to be relevant to the departments you represent as we work on stipend advocacy.
 - o The average stipend in this department is \$30k.
 - o 43% of stipends go to rent.
 - o The majority of students do have roommates.

- o There is anxiety about the cost of rent and increasing rent costs.
- o Around \$500 for Groceries a month
- o Around \$150 for transport and commuting costs
- o In conclusion, we plan on using the survey to negotiate with our department for better stipends.
- o Stipends should be adjusted yearly based on changing cost of living data.
- o Please support the UCW-CWA in advocacy for better stipends for graduate students. There is a Grad rally for Higher Pay on Tuesday, April 25th from 3-4pm outside McClung Tower.
- Comment from Senator #71: Would it be valuable or helpful for the GSS to collect cost of living info more broadly?
- o A: There is already a Basic Needs survey distributed across campus.

Announcements/Member's Privilege

• Comment from Senator #72:

- o A reminder/invitation will be sent to GSS senators over Slack.

• Comments from Senator #77:

- o Graduation photoshoots are happening all over campus with champagne bottles and things being used as props, and there is little clean up happening outside Ayers Hall.
- Parking issues where people without passes are taking parking spots needed by graduate students.
- The Graduate school has allocated some funds to distribute to incoming students and raise stipends from 30k to 34k, but they are not distributed equally. We wish they could be distributed equally among student, not selectively.
- New performance-based stipends are for incoming students only current grad students are not being considered for those which feels unfair.

• Comment from George:

- o Going forward we can expect better parking management and we hope to have more information regarding parking at the next senate meeting in May.
- O As far as the clean-up from the photoshoots, not sure who to contact about those concerns, but maybe start with Facilities Services.
- O As far as stipends, and stipend inequality and inequity, one of the big issues we have run into is the fact that the faculty are also facing similar issues in equitable pay. Asking the university to limit the disparity between min and max stipends/pay is very hard to do. The university at best can set the minimums, so we can ask for them to raise the minimums. But maximums, and the disparity between min and max, are more complicated to address. We will address these issues hopefully with the Chancellor on May 9th.

• Comment from Senator #75:

- o I was wondering if there will be an increase of funds for Academic Support and Travel Awards.
- Response from Senator #72: We are at our budget and are at the point where we will be maxed
 out. We did get an increase in funds this year and increased the average number of awards given
 out. I don't think an increase further than that will go much farther, especially considering how

we only fund a portion of travel, and if we award more then it ends up taking the funding responsibility away from the individual departments - who really need to be stepping up to fund their respective students.

- Comment from George: We had a rollover from last year for academic support that went towards awards this year, but that was a one-time thing. Totals in awards are \$153k for Academic Support; \$250k for Travel Awards already distributed; and \$100k left for the last of the Travel Awards this year which will be entirely used up.
- Comment from Dean Thompson: One thing is we need to figure out a process to get departments and colleges to commit to exactly what they want to contribute to support for their students so we can have better awards and spending of our award funds.
- Comment from Senator #95: Are there any updates to the initiative for support for international students?
 - **Response from George:** It is mostly a scheduling issue between all our partners. We have a pledge of support from all our groups, we just need to follow up on that. I know that there are a handful of senators ready to get started, and as we get ready for the next academic year, we need to be ready for our incoming international students and be proactive on how to support them especially in terms of things like housing.
- Comment from Senator #29: There are not many options on campus for food choices. I do not understand why we cannot have more choices and I would like to discuss this with the senate. It iks extremely hard to eat well and be healthy here on campus.
- Comment from Senator #33: I want to second that, not just in pricing but also in quality of food, it is hard to eat well here when we are working for long hours on campus daily. It seems like maybe bringing in more food trucks would be an easy solution to have more variety and include smaller businesses from the community.
- Comment from Dean Thompson: I am recommending that GSS join partners with SGA on this issue to get this issue heard and addressed on campus.
- Comment from Senator #77: I recommend going to Stokely Hall. It is about \$10 a meal to use the buffet, even though it might take more time than stopping at a POD Market.
- Comment from Senator #52: Also, faculty get a 15% discount at the POD Markets.
- Question from Senator #43: Two questions. First, what is the \$500 number?

 Answer from Senator #72: This is the average number of funding I get from other sources such as advisors, departments, etc...
- Question from Senator #43: Staff also get a discount, so at a minimum Graduate Students should be getting some kind of help as well is there not something we can do to get a discount as well at any of the POD or food places on campus?
- Comment from Senator #91: Any updates on housing/master lease agreements?

 Response from George: If there is going to be a master lease agreement, it sounds like that will go to undergrads despite the work we've done this semester. Hopefully going into the next academic year, hopefully we can get some kind of pledge or agreement of support for the future. I am optimistic about change, but not optimistic about the time it would take for that change to happen.

- Announcement from Senator #18: Once again, please join UCW for the rally on Tuesday, 3-4pm, in front of McClung Tower to advocate for better stipends.
- Reminder from Zane (Senator #97): If you are graduating, don't forget to get your GSS graduation cords.






How much do you spend on Housing per

How much do you spend on Housing per Month?




Do you have Roommates? If so how many?







How much do you spend on Housing per Month?










Has your Rent increased in the last 12 months? If so by what percentage??

Has your Rent increased in the last 12 months? If so by what percentage?




Rate the quality of your current housing






Do you expect your Rent to increase in the next 12 months? Do you expect your Rent to increase in the next 12 months?



Does the Cost of Living versus Stipend cause any Stress/Concern?


Does the Cost of Living versus Stipend cause any Stress/Concern



How much do you spend on Groceries per


Month?

How much do you spend on Groceries per Month?





Are you primarily based at UT or ORNL?


Are you primarily based at UT or ORNL?



How much do you spend on Travel per month?




